

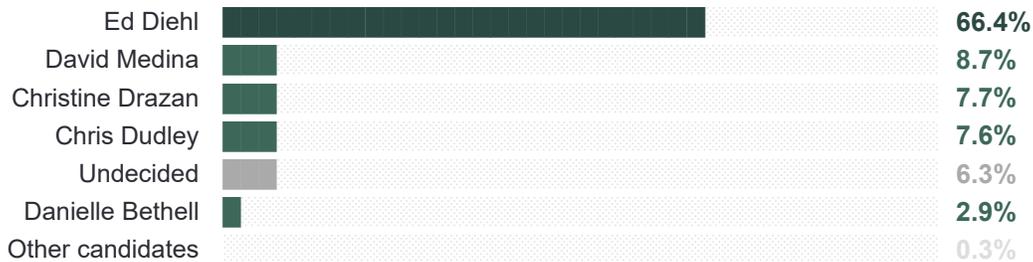
What 1,022 Oregon Voters Told Us About the 2026 Governor's Race

Independent Poll & Analysis · Conducted March 3–8, 2026 · n=1,022 Completed Responses

March 3 – 8, 2026. In a little over five days, 1,022 Oregon voters from across the state weighed in on the 2026 Republican gubernatorial primary. Who they'd vote for, who is likely to win in November, favorability, vote flow, and more. Primary ballot and scenario questions were asked of Republican respondents only (n=921). General election questions asked of all respondents.

FIRST CHOICE: REPUBLICAN GOVERNOR PRIMARY?

"If the Republican primary for governor were held today, who would you vote for?" Candidates were listed in randomized order.

PERCEIVED TOP-4 FINISHERS

We also asked: "Regardless of your own preference, which four candidates do you expect to finish in the top four?"

HOW REPUBLICANS ACTUALLY FEEL ABOUT EACH CANDIDATE

We asked respondents to rate their overall impression of each candidate on a scale of 1 (Very Unfavorable) to 5 (Very Favorable), with 3 being neutral or no opinion.

WHAT IF THE FIELD CHANGES? FOUR SCENARIOS TESTED

This is where the data gets interesting. We gave Republican respondents four “what if” scenarios — different versions of a narrowed primary field — and asked how they’d vote in each. Here’s what happened.

Scenario	Diehl	2nd Place	3rd Place	Key Takeaway
A: Three-way — Diehl, Drazan, Dudley	74.6%	Dudley 10.5%	Drazan 10.2%	Diehl dominates
B: Full field without Dudley	71.9%	Medina 10.0%	Drazan 9.3%	Half of Dudley’s voters go to Diehl
C: Full field without Diehl	N/A	Drazan 25.8%	Medina 23.4%	No clear winner emerges
D: Diehl vs. Drazan head-to-head	81.5%	Drazan 12.2%	—	Decisive two-to-one margin

SCENARIO C: No Diehl

No candidate appeared to have a natural claim on Diehl’s coalition. If Diehl were not in the race, it pointed to the most unpredictable and fragmented in the field. Rather than consolidating around a single alternative, Diehl’s 609 voters split nearly equally four ways:

Drazan 24.8% • Bethell 22.5% • Medina 20.9% • Dudley 18.7% • Undecided 13.1%

WHO CAN WIN IN NOVEMBER? GENERAL ELECTION vs. GOVERNOR TINA KOTEK

We asked all 1,022 respondents to rate how likely each Republican candidate would be to defeat Governor Kotek in the general election. Scale: 1 = Kotek definitely wins, 3 = Too close to call, 5 = Republican definitely wins.

PERCEPTIONS WORTH NOTING:

Oregon general elections are decided by Non-Affiliated voters. Diehl is seen as competitive by nearly three-quarters of that group. Drazan and Dudley are in the mid-60s. Bethell and Medina sit at 30%.

We also asked who respondents would actually vote for in each general election matchup. Diehl produces the lowest ‘won’t vote’ rate among Republicans (1.7%) and the highest Republican turnout intent (96.8%). Drazan produces the highest ‘won’t vote’ rate at 5.8% — more than 3× Diehl’s (1.7%) and nearly 2× the next highest “won’t vote,” Medina’s (3.2%) — meaning she loses more of her own party’s voters in November than any other candidate tested.

GEOGRAPHIC REACH

759 of 1,022 respondents (74.3%) provided zip codes, spread across 230 unique zip codes statewide.

METHODOLOGY

n=1,022 self-selected respondents recruited via Oregon-focused political social media and organic spread, March 3–8, 2026. Non-probability sample — traditional margin of error calculations do not apply and are not reported. Results are directional indicators. Seven independent question types — full-field primary, perceived top-four, favorability, four scenario tests, second-choice flow, and general election ratings — all pointed in the same direction. Survey completion rate: 84.6%, roughly 3× the typical rate for self-selected online polls. Raw data available upon request.

Republicans: n=921 completed. Non-Republicans (NAV, Democrat, Other): n=101. Primary ballot and scenario questions asked of Republican respondents only. General election questions asked of all respondents.

Predict Oregon is an independent polling project, not affiliated with any campaign, party, or political organization. It is directed by Mark Anderson, MBA, who has analyzed Oregon politics since 2008 and served in multiple capacities within Oregon Republican politics and its grassroots organizations. This poll was conducted independently and without compensation from any campaign or political organization.
